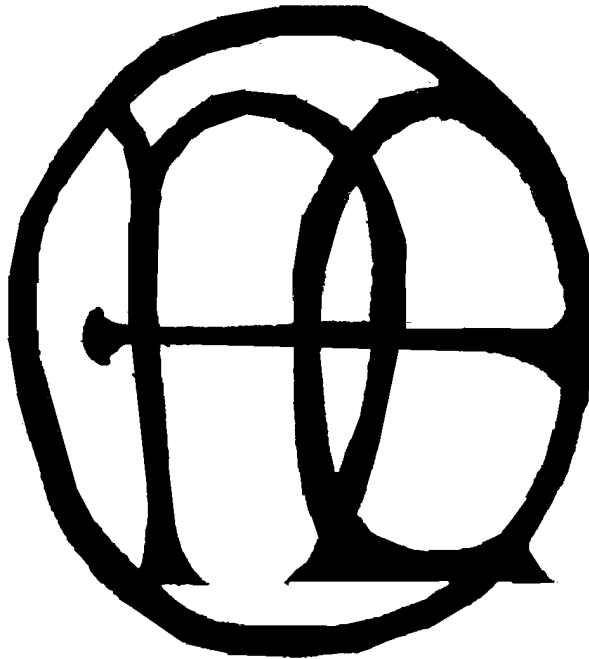

Ancient World (Greece & Rome)

Constantine beyond Christianity

2012 sees the 1700th anniversary of the battle of the Milvian Bridge. Frequently described as a decisive moment of the Roman Empire, this battle is often portrayed as the decisive turning point between the 'good' 'Christian' Emperor Constantine and the bad 'Pagan' Emperor Maxentius. Apart from the date and the protagonists most of these assessments have been challenged recently.

This five week course will reexamine the life of Constantine, focusing on what the sources say (and don't say) about him, beyond his popular image as the Emperor who turned the Roman Empire Christian.

We will be focusing on his extensive reforms of much of the empire's administration, on how he included his large family (especially the women) in the running of the empire and on his often neglected role as one of Rome's most active military Emperors. There will also be time to look at his large scale building programmes, including the building of the new capital city: Constantinople.

Most have heard of the battle of Cannae, but this day school will look at the whole story of events over the 18 years between 218BC, when Hannibal crossed the Alps and 201BC, when Carthage sued for peace.

The Founders of Kew Gardens

At a time when the world's vegetation and rare plants are under increasing threat from the rising human population and global environmental changes, the collections and expertise of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew have never been more relevant. These impressive gardens began with the support and encouragement of George III but they owe their global significance to the wisdom and foresight of three eminent botanists: Joseph Banks, William Hooker and Joseph Hooker. These men travelled widely and negotiated with naturalists and collectors all over the world. They engaged illustrators of the highest calibre and they made massive contributions to the classification of plants. Their story is one of dedication, bravery, insight and over-whelming self-confidence. It will be told with the aid of illustrated talks, supported by detailed notes. There will be ample opportunity for discussion.

Reading Latin: Livy and the Songs of the Vagantes

During the spring term we plan to look at two very different pieces of literature: Livy's account of the Wars with Hannibal, as an example of Roman history of the first century BC. This term we will be concentrating on Hannibal's great opponent Scipio Africanus.

We will also be looking at examples of the late Latin poetry of the Vagantes, song writers who wrote in Latin for a non court audience, often satirical, frequently funny and usually down to earth.

Required Language skills:

Newcomers to the group are always welcome, but should have Latin skills of a level that they can attempt reading original texts. (ie. roughly Latin GCSE or AS level, alternatively having finished the Cambridge Latin Course).

Recommended Reading:

A familiarity with the rough outline of the Second Punic Wars would be helpful to place the passages in context and understand some of the comments. A.Goldsworthy's or Greg Daly's, "Cannae" might be a good start.

Literature

Browning and the Dramatic Monologue

Barry Wood

Although there are examples of the dramatic monologue from at least the late sixteenth century, it was Browning who consciously developed it as a distinct form of lyric/reflective poetry. As Eliot said, Browning “invented the dramatic monologue”, the most flexible and characteristic genre of English verse. The invention had a considerable influence on later Victorian and Modern poetry—for example, on the work of John Davidson, Eliot, Pound and Stevens.

The course will consider Browning’s own use of the form in *Men and Women* and will examine the versatility with which he uses the form to explore a variety of psychological and moral character, personality and attitude. The course will also look at other poets who—whether influenced directly or not—also experimented with and developed the form.

Music

An introduction to Wagner's operas I – from The Flying Dutchman to Tristan and Isolde

As we approach the bi-centenary of Wagner's birth, I hope to run three self-contained courses tracing his operatic career from The Flying Dutchman through to Parsifal.

The first of these will begin with The Flying Dutchman, Tannhäuser and Lohengrin, showing how Wagner's distinctive approach to music drama emerged, and placing him in the context of German opera of the period. Tristan and Isolde is, of course, regarded as a crucial work in the development of 19th-century music, and we shall end the course by exploring its methods and influence in detail.

Recommended reading:

The English National Opera Guides on these four operas (Nos.12, 39, 47 and 6 respectively) each contain translations of the libretti (useful for the course!) and essays on the plots and backgrounds of the works.

Choral Music II: The Romantic Period

Gareth Curtis

From the early 19th century onwards, the ‘Big Choral Work’ took on a special significance in European music life. Not only was it often part of the ambitious composer’s route to greatness, but commissioning such works became a common way of marking especially significant national or civic occasions.

In this respect, two types came to the fore, the oratorio and the requiem setting, both of which will figure highly in this course. However, we shall also look at ways in which major choral works might remain within the Church, or might even move into completely secular subject matter.

Though this course follows on from last term, and will follow a similar pattern (i.e. we shall concentrate on individual works rather than attempt a general history of the topic), it is designed to be entirely self-standing.

DAYSCHOOL: The stories music tells

This course is connected with my ‘...for the listener’ series, and explores the narrative quality of music.

Of course, the obvious way to tell a story in music is to use words – supposing, though, that we only have instruments? How can music tell a story or even conjure up a specific atmosphere (i.e. not just happy or sad) which is outside the realms of melody and harmony? To what extent, for example, might music contain signals which we recognise or interpret? And what artistic purpose does this sort of thing really fulfil?

Finally, some would suggest that music can have a narrative quality without referring to anything external. What might this mean? How far, for example, might this possibility help us to understand a symphony movement?

DAYSCHOOL: Weber - a forgotten master?

Over the years, Weber's reputation has drifted – perhaps because his music sounds as if it belongs to the Romantic period, yet he died before Beethoven and Schubert. Tricky as it may be to place nowadays, in his time he achieved wide and enthusiastic acclaim. Commentators as diverse as Berlioz and Wagner regarded him as one of the greatest and most influential composers of the period; and, in Paris at least, the number of performances of his works at orchestral concerts was only surpassed by Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven.

This study day will briefly survey the sheer range of his output. However, we shall also spend time on a few key masterpieces (including the 1820s operas *Der Freischütz* and *Euryanthe*), exploring Weber's remarkable contribution to the development of German Romantic music.
